Personally, throughout the years, I found that my varied experiences with the range of clients and school settings enhanced my perspective in working effectively with everyone involved. I have always encouraged my grad students and supervisees to seek multi-faceted positions.

Describe a challenge you have faced as an educational therapist:

Probably my biggest challenge was figuring out how to retire from the profession that I have loved for so many years. After co-editing the second edition of the textbook, Clinical Practice of Educational Therapy, in 2018, I realized that this was an opportune time to evaluate my contribution to my profession- to gradually retire from my practice, and volunteer.

Describe a highlight of your educational therapy career:

Since I have lived in the same community for almost 50 years, it is a blessing to bump into former parents who share success stories about their children, now grown, many with children of their own. Working as an ed therapist has affected me in so many valuable ways. We learn so much about ourselvers - it is a gift.

What do you think the future of the educational therapy profession will look like?

I hope the new ET outreach programs at CSUN will become a catalyst for future programs to include educational therapy in the special school service teams. With more national and international recognition, our field will grow exponentially, helping more children and adults reach their potential.
